# **Coronavirus (COVID-19)** Information

# Update 9: March 23, 2020

Good afternoon,

"It is not a time for business as usual," Governor Murphy stated at this afternoon's press conference. Governor Phil Murphy today signed <u>Executive Order No. 109</u>, directing the suspension of all elective surgeries and invasive procedures performed on adults that are scheduled to take place after 5:00 p.m. on Friday, March 27.

The "Stay at Home" **Executive Order No. 107** remains in full effect. Work at manufacturing sites may continue, as can research, trucking, and transportation operations.

The governor mentioned that the state has a critical need for Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). He stated that If anyone in NJ has any of these supplies and would like to donate them, to please email <u>ppedonations@njsp.org</u>

Where teleworking or working from home is not an option, there is a strong request to reduce staff on site to the minimal number to ensure safe operations. To the extent a business or non-profit has employees that cannot perform their functions via telework or work-from-home arrangements, the business or non-profit should make best efforts to reduce staff on site to the minimal number necessary to ensure that essential operations can safely continue.

Employees reporting to work are permitted to travel to and from their place of business. Businesses are encouraged to give each employee a letter indicating that the employee works in an industry permitted to continue operations.

Essential employees should have the company letter, and company ID accessible while driving to and from work, so they can present it with their license if necessary. We suggest the <u>DHS Guidance to help with the letter</u>.

CCNJ continues to share its concerns with DEP about ongoing inspections and site visits during this crisis. We are exploring all avenues to seek a solution. It is our understanding that the US Department of Homeland Security & Preparedness have stopped CFATS visits.

<u>Private Sector Essential Employee Registration Project</u>. CCNJ member companies seeking entry into this program should reach out to Elvin Montero. Just a reminder this is a program for Critical Infrastructure facilities. <u>Please, do not forward CCNJ's email to</u>

your service providers, as CCNJ will not be able to get them access to the program at this time. It is likely that OEM will reach out to you via phone first, and even over the weekend. We ask for everyone's patience with this if you have submitted your request and haven't heard from OEM.

The self-assessment tool to determine what actions you can take to protect you and your loved ones' health and help determine whether you should be tested for COVID-19. 



Presidential Policy Directive 21 (PPD-21): PPD-21 identifies 16 critical infrastructure sectors.
