Update 18: April 7, 2020

Good afternoon,

Since state laws requires that a Public Health Emergency declared by the governor automatically terminate after 30 days, today Governor Murphy announced that he would renew the Public Health Emergency, declared on March 9, 2020 in E.O. 103, for another 30 days by singing $\underline{\text{E.O. 119}}$.

E.O. 119 ensures that all Executive Orders adopted in whole or in part based on the authority under the NJ Emergency Health Powers Act to respond to the Public Health Emergency presented by the COVID-19 outbreak remain in full force and effect.

Of note, <u>E.O. 119</u> confirms that there are thousands of law enforcement officers in New Jersey currently unable to report to duty, the vast majority of which because they tested positive for COVID-19 or are currently in quarantine, and so this allows for precious limited law enforcement resources remain dedicated to the COVID-19 response.

In total, Governor Murphy signed four Executive Orders:

- <u>E.O. 116</u>: Governor Murphy Signs Executive Order Extending Statutory Deadlines for School Districts Whose Elections Were Moved from April to May
- <u>E.O. 117</u>: Governor Murphy Signs Executive Order Waiving Student Assessment Requirements for 2019-2020 School Year.
- <u>E.O. 118</u>: Governor Murphy Signs Executive Order Closing State and County Parks to Further Social Distancing.
- <u>E.O. 119</u>: Governor Murphy Signs Executive Order Extending Public Health Emergency in New Jersey

CONSTRUCTION GUIDANCE EXPECTED

CCNJ has learned from multiple sources that the Murphy Administration is strongly considering new restrictions on construction operations. It is likely that the governor will issue a new Executive Order identifying "essential" and "non-essential" construction activities at tomorrow's press conference, with the assumption that "non-essential" construction will have to stop. We should have more information to share tomorrow if this is the case.

"STAY AT HOME" EXECUTIVE ORDER 107 STILL IN PLACE

The "Stay at Home" <u>Executive Order No. 107</u> remains in full effect. "Manufacturing, industrial, logistics, ports, heavy construction, shipping, food production, food delivery, and other commercial operations may continue to operate...."

Governor continues to remind the private sector that even though the E.O. deems manufacturing and other businesses essential, **social distancing and CDC guidelines must be followed at those locations**.

As a reminder, <u>Executive Order No. 108</u> invalidates any county or municipal restriction that in any way will or might conflict with any of the provisions of <u>Executive Order No.</u> 107. Earlier today we received notification that Perth Amboy was imposing a "Total Shutdown Order." Realizing that this order was in clear violation of E.O. 108, CCNJ acted quickly to inform all necessary agencies to get the issue resolved. The Perth Amboy order has since been rescinded. If you come across with other orders you feel may violate E.O. 107/108, please reach out to CCNJ or you can report via <u>the state's COVID-19 site</u>.

Employees reporting to work are permitted to travel to and from their place of business. Businesses are encouraged to give each employee a letter indicating that the employee works in an industry permitted to continue operations. Essential employees should have the company letter, and company ID accessible while driving to and from work, so they can present it with their license if necessary. We suggest the DHS Guidance to help with the letter.

PRIVATE SECTOR ESSENTIAL EMPLOYEE REGISTRATION PROJECT

OEM has established a temporary process to help get critical infrastructure sites approved faster and provide essential employees with a temporary essential employee verification document that will expire in August 2020.

Any CCNJ member company that is deemed <u>critical infrastructure</u> by the Manufacturing and Chemical Sector section in the CISA document, and is not in the system, but would like to be considered for the temporary program, please email Elvin Montero with your contact information.



With these, our statewide total has now eclipsed 1,000. It sits now at 1,003.
