Update 11: March 25, 2020

Good afternoon,

Today Governor Murphy signed <u>Executive Order 110</u> requiring all childcare centers in New Jersey that wish to continue operating to certify that they will solely serve the children of essential workers. The deadline to certify is Friday, March 27. Beginning Wednesday, April 1, only childcare centers that exclusively serve the children of essential workers will be allowed to remain open. Section 5 F does cover our essential workers.

Late yesterday, the state identified <u>new essential businesses</u>: Mobile phone retail and repair shops; Bicycle shops, but only to provide service and repair; Livestock feed stores; Nurseries and garden centers; and Farming equipment stores.

State still has a critical need for Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). You may send information about supplies, like masks, gloves, hand sanitizers, that your company would like to donate to <u>ppedonations@njsp.org.</u>

Earlier today, Dennis Hart sent out an email providing some guidance on <u>Executive</u> <u>Order 109, Section 7</u>, requiring all businesses in possession of <u>PPE</u>, ventilators, respirators, or anesthesia machines that are not required for the provision of critical health care services to undertake an inventory of such supplies and send that information to the state by no later than 5:00 p.m. on 6 Friday, March 27, 2020.

CCNJ as of this update has not received any more guidance on the process or inventory form. Once we do, we will send it out to all members ASAP – even before the next update. Earlier today, we asked OEM about the process, and they discussed the PPE donation email. While we would be OK with that email accepting information, CCNJ asked for an inventory form and stressed that the state clarify what PPE it is seeking (i.e. masks, latex gloves, etc.), which will help our members provide accurate information. Some type of form with PPE listed will also save precious time for everyone, while providing consistent information. CCNJ doesn't want staff using precious time to inventory all PPE that is of no use to the state. That is why CCNJ believes if OEM provides a form that will help facilitate the process and provide the state with better information. We are awaiting more information from the chief of the Critical Infrastructure Bureau at the ROIC.

NJ DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY AFFAIRS – ONGOING CONSTRUCTION / INSPECTIONS DCA is releasing guidance addressing the construction industry's concerns about the interruption of plan review and inspection responsibilities at the state or local levels due to the COVID-19 emergency:

Pursuant to Executive Orders 107 and 108, at this time, local enforcing agencies (LEAs) cannot restrict code officials from performing their obligations under the Uniform Construction Code (UCC), N.J.A.C. 5:23. In response to this, the Department of Community Affairs has temporarily relaxed and modified certain provisions concerning Minor work (N.J.A.C. 5:23-2.17A), Inspections (N.J.A.C. 5:23-2.18), and Certificate requirements (N.J.A.C. 5:23-2.23) in order to ensure the continuity of construction without a detriment to the public welfare during the COVID-19 pandemic. The below guidance explains these rule modifications.

In addition, DCA will be issuing Temporary Rule Relaxation of certain provisions of Title 5, New Jersey Administrative Code.

U.S. DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION ENFORCEMENT AND COMPLIANCE DISCRETION

The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) and the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA) have issued a notice, guidance document, enforcement policies, and regulatory waiver for various DOT regulatory requirements re: CDLs/CLPs, DOT drug-and-alcohol testing, and hazardous materials training requirements.

"STAY AT HOME" EXECUTIVE ORDER 107

The "Stay at Home" **Executive Order No. 107** remains in full effect. "**Manufacturing**, industrial, logistics, ports, heavy construction, shipping, food production, food delivery, and other commercial operations may continue to operate...."

While this is not a concern for our industries that have been deemed essential, just be aware that the state has set up a <u>website</u> where employees can report a possible violation of <u>Executive Order No. 107</u> using an online form. The form goes into OEM, and they will then verify the information.

Where teleworking or working from home is not an option, there is a strong request to reduce staff on site **TO THE MINIMAL NUMBER TO ENSURE SAFE OPERATIONS.**

Employees reporting to work are permitted to travel to and from their place of business. Businesses are encouraged to give each employee a letter indicating that the employee works in an industry permitted to continue operations. Essential employees should have the company letter, and company ID accessible while driving to and from work, so they can present it with their license if necessary. We suggest the <u>DHS Guidance to help with the letter</u>.

PRIVATE SECTOR ESSENTIAL EMPLOYEE REGISTRATION PROJECT

OEM is developing a temporary process to help get critical infrastructure sites approved faster and provide essential employees with a temporary essential employee verification document that will expire in August 2020. Companies that get the temporary approval will then be required to take a training course in September to be able to maintain essential status and provide permanent cards to essential employees.

OEM will still require that you identify the number of employees that are essential. Remember, the state has instructed all businesses, including manufacturing deemed essential, to maintain social distancing and CDC guidelines, and have on site the minimal amount of staff required for safe operations.






